

TIPS FOR EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATION

Useful tips for communicating with Deaf or hard of hearing people:

- Face, and speak directly to, the deaf or hard of hearing person (not their hearing aid).
- Speak and articulate clearly but at a normal level. Shouting is not beneficial.
- Ensure the environment is well – lit and your face is not silhouetted by bright lighting.
- Ensure a clear view of your mouth by keeping hands and other objects away.
- If the deaf or hard of hearing person does not understand a question or comment, rephrase it.
- Talk in short sentences to less room for error.
- Eliminate background noises as much as possible.
- If you need to get the attention of a deaf or hard of hearing person, approach them and tap them on the shoulder. Ensure you have their attention before you start speaking.
- Be aware that not all deaf or hard of hearing people wear hearing aids.
- Be aware hearing aids do not enable a deaf or hard of hearing person to hear everything that is said.



Useful tips for communicating with a deaf person through an interpreter:

- Talk directly to the deaf person. The interpreter is there only to facilitate communication. When the interpreter says “I” or “me” they are speaking for the deaf person, not themselves.
- Talk at a normal speed. If the interpreter needs you to slow down, they will ask.
- Allow time for the interpretation. Auslan does not follow English word order so the interpreter will listen for the meaning begin interpreting
- when it is suitable to do so. As such, you may be speaking but the interpreter not signing or the Deaf person signing but the interpreter not speaking .
- Sit opposite the deaf person. Generally the interpreter will sit next to you so the Deaf person can see both the interpreter and you at the same time.
- Provide the interpreter with relevant background material ahead of time.
- Allow for 10–15 minute breaks every hour if the interpreter is working on their own. everything that is said.
